As a non-profit educational and humanitarian organization, CMVHR is dedicated to the rescue and rehabilitation of horses and to teaching kindness and compassion for all living beings. Moreover, we are committed to helping people of all ages and abilities learn vital skills about life, find selfconfidence, self-esteem, discover their own potential and experience the healing power of horses. Since 2003, private philanthropy from friends like you has set a foundation for our success on which we are growing and expanding to change more lives for the better --- one horse at a time and one person at a time.

In our 14 years, we've helped raise a lot of kids and have watched them grow and flourish. Noah, who is starting his second summer with us through OneWorkSource, a federally funded program for which we are an approved worksite, first came to CMVHR in kindergarten

on a school field trip. For graduation this June, his mother made a collage of then and now photos. She asked for our help with the bookends of the collage – then and now – which were both taken here at the farm twelve years apart.

Our veterinary internship program continues to shine as well. Emily, our 2004 intern just graduated from the College of Veterinary Medicine at CSU. Her dad sent us the news with a note of thanks and a gift. Cassandra, our 2011 intern is a certified vet tech. She visits every year and is like a daughter. Today, we have the privilege of mentoring Lydia, an 11 year old aspiring veterinarian (pgs 3 & 8).

In addition to internships, our work with at-risk youth has ongoing impact. This winter an 18 year old young man completed 100 hours of community service as a condition of probation. He endured the weather. enjoyed the challenge and discovered the magical healing power of the horse. Sometimes it's just about giving someone an opportunity they don't otherwise have. For this young man, his dream was to join the Army; a dream that is now

coming true. Without his time here he would not have qualified for service. This is why we do it. Our donors make it possible.

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CAMPAIGN & REHABILITATION CENTER UPDATE

In November, 2016, we launched a capital campaign to build the Sally E. Morehouse Memorial Rehabilitation and Training Center. The primary purpose of this center is to enable us to be a facility that provides hope, healing and recovery in all seasons. Our campaign goal was set at \$75,000. We are thrilled to announce that donors respond-

ed quickly and generously and by early February, we raised enough money to break ground on construction. We want to thank everyone who made this possible.

The building is already in use and fulfilling the vision. It is with tremendous pride that we share the news that CMVHR is now a host site for the Essex County EquiRiders 4-H Club. (below right photo and story on page 3)

We still have some work to do to complete the project as envisioned, including installing a rolling garage door and a people door. The doors will protect riders and program participants from the elements while allowing horses, equipment and people to enter and exit. Door installation is on the docket of summer projects. Commemorating



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Sally for whom the building is named is another task on which we are working. Eddie is adding his personal touch with original artwork. Sally lost her ability to walk at an early age, but she never lost her courage, strength, sense of humor, positive outlook or her compassion for all living beings. She and Buck, one of our rescue horses, developed an unbreakable bond. Buck recognized Sally's vulnerabilities and would gently nuzzle her hair and stand quietly for Sally to brush him from her wheelchair. Sally passed away October 2016. It is an honor to carry on Sally's legacy of fostering kindness and hope through our work.

A building dedication is being planned for 2018 to coincide with CMVHR's 15th anniversary. A save-the-date notification will be included in our winter issue of *The Horse's Voice*. We are grateful to the donors who made the Sally E. Morehouse Memorial Rehabilitation and Training Center possible. Thank you, beyond words. Your backing and belief in our work is inspiring.



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EXPANDING OUR REACH


With thanks to the generosity of an anonymous donor, in August 2016 we hired a full-time barn manager, Chauntel Gillilland. Having our first-ever paid position has enabled us to not only increase our capacity for equine rescue and rehabilitation, but has also enabled us to expand our reach and impact through education and outreach programs.

By way of example, CMVHR is a new host site for the Essex County Equi-Riders 4-H Club. Chauntel and Laura Benedict are the Club leaders and Nancy and Eddie have been recruited to be 4-H volunteers. Despite the name, this is not a riding club but a learning program. Members participate in horse hippology and horse bowl to enhance their understanding of equine science and husbandry. They watch demonstrations on hoof and veterinary care and with our rescue horses, get handson experience. Since April, experiential learning with the horses has included listening for a heartbeat and belly sounds through a stethoscope, checking digital pulse, braiding and banding manes for showing, and saddle fitting. As a safety measure, kids are required to wear helmets for all hands-on horse activities. Helmets are provided for those who don't have their own.

Chauntel has also enabled us to expand our volunteer programs, especially for youth. Our policy is that there



are at least two adults and one vehicle on the premises whenever we are working with youth volunteers under the age of 18. With Chauntel here during the week, we have been able to expand our program for kids to come to the farm during school breaks. Some of our volunteers, like Kelly (right photo) come from as far away as Long Island to spend time with Chauntel and the horses.

Time does fly. This photo was taken in 2011 at the conclusion of Cassandra's veterinary internship with us through Becker College. We worked with Cassandra and the school to design a summer program to qualify for course credit — at no charge to the school or Cassandra.

Prior to coming to CMVHR, Cassandra's assignment was to write a paper describing what she would do to evaluate a rescue horse that experienced trauma, and set a path for recovery — physical and emotional. Once at the farm, Cassandra did just that. She worked side-by-side with Eddie to evaluate and rehabilitate Mazy, a horse with a horrific fear of saddles. At the end of her six weeks, Cassandra was not only saddling Mazy without issue, she was riding her.

After the experiential learning component of the internship, Cassandra revisited her paper and edited it based on the actual experience versus the hypothetical. Today, Cassandra is a certified veterinary technician. Forever, she will be our friend.

In 2004, before relocating our farm from Thurman, NY to Westport we had the privilege and pleasure of welcoming Emily Cotran as a veterinary intern for the summer. Emily stayed with a friend nearby and came daily to work handson with the horses. To earn recognized credit for her school, Emily was required to engage in all horse care activities with a particular focus on feeding and nutrition, veterinary, dental and hoof care, rehabilitation, training and conditioning. The photo below is Emily exercising Silverado — who has since found his forever, loving home. We were thrilled to learn this winter from Emily's dad, who continues to support our work annually in honor of his daughter, that Emily recently graduated from the School of College of Veterinary Medicine at Colorado State. 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RESCUE WORK TAKES A TEAM

Operating a horse rescue program is a 365 day a year commitment. To do it right, it takes a team of people dedicated to the care of the animals. With rescue horses who often come with unknown and unforeseen emotional scars, the bench of devoted professionals has to be deep. As an example, we are very fortunate to have two farriers. Tim has been with us for 17 years and travels 1 1/2 hours one-way every six to eight weeks. Autumn teamed up with us three years ago when we rescued our first horse with a fear of men so bad, he wouldn't let Tim or Eddie anywhere near

him. We now have two horses that fear men. Autumn tends to them and Tim and Autumn work as a team for two other horses who require trimming every three to four weeks. They stagger their schedules and it works great.

Dedicated veterinarians are the other critical part of our successful team. These photos are snapshots of Vermont Large Animal Clinic veterinarians - Dr. Phil. Dr. Amanda and Dr. Amber —





during their annual spring visit to vaccinate horses, perform dental work, and do other procedures as necessary including lameness exams, x-rays, castrations, blood work, physicals, etc.

In addition to exceptional horse care. VLAC specializes in training the next generation of veterinarians through internship programs. We are grateful to Dr. Phil and his

team for helping us advance experiential learning by allowing CMVHR volunteers, like Lydia, who aspire to be large animal vets to assist where they are able.

We are grateful to our team of dedicated professionals and our generous donors who positively impact so many lives.
