This spring brought sudden change to all of our lives. The news surrounding us daily about COVID-19 can cause anxiety and stress. We would like you to know that you are not alone. We're in this together.

Saving Horses, Healing Hearts is our mantra. Our farm has always been a place of peace, hope and love. Love from the horses who give us their all and hope from the people who make CMVHR's work possible—our donors, volunteers and staff—from friends like you.

As an animal shelter, we are considered an 'essential service' in New York State (NYS), meaning our work continues at full strength and we stand ready to respond when the calls come in. It also means we are able to retain our staff team and status as a local employer.

By NYS executive order, we are temporarily closed to the public and have suspended our community outreach programs. For the kids who participate in our afterschool program, we are offering on-line activities on our CMVHR After-School Facebook Page. Two of our amazing volunteers, Gail and Laurie, are helping to create activities to keep the kids energized, involved and connected. Our volunteers are doing this remotely—selflessly leading with kindness and compassion.

SAVING ANIMALS



In addition to assisting law enforcement with cruelty cases, we also help people in need. In June 2019, as part of a compassionate intervention we took in two sheep (below), two cows, two horses and a chicken. Their owner had lost his wife unexpectedly, and he was battling cancer. Caring for his animals had become a challenge for him and his 90 year old sister. He called and asked for our help.

This was a difficult and courageous decision for him and we are honored he chose us. The photos below are of the sheep (Tommy and Marley) before and after they were sheared in April of this year. Mary, the shearer, is in the top photo setting up as Tommy and Marley eagerly wait in anticipation. After being liberated from all that wool, they add an extra scoop of gratitude to our donors and all who make it possible for us to help animals and people in need.

We are happy to share that their former owner is doing well in his fight against cancer and comes to visit on occasion. When he does, he fills with joy to see his friends thriving, and they perk up with excitement at the sound of his voice and his presence. Savings animals and helping people—it's what we do—with thanks to friends like you.

As an accredited humane agency, Crane Mountain Valley Horse Rescue assists and trains law enforcement and other agencies on investigating suspect equine cruelty cases. In most situations that means accompanying law enforcement on the scene, taking the horses into our care and custody, and testifying in court during the legal process. Other times, we work behind the scenes advising and supporting law enforcement through the process.

September 2019, NYS Agriculture & Markets and Clinton County Sherriff asked for our assistance with a potential hoarding situation involving two horses (above) and some 40 dogs. Because we were at capacity for the number of animals in our care when the call came in, we reached out to a close circle of friends for help. One of our friends immediately stepped up to assist with the horses and a local small animal shelter took the lead on the dogs.

The owners of the animals agreed to surrender all of them. At the Sheriff's request, we prepared the legal documents for the owners to sign. Our friend, accompanied by the Sheriff, picked up the horses and brought them to her farm. The horse's conditions were evaluated, their wounds treated and their road to recovery for a new life began. We are grateful to our friend, Amy, who stepped up without hesitation to help and to our donors who make it possible for us to respond when the calls come in. We never know when the call will come, we just know it will.

SERVING COMMUNITY




<u>Finding My Peach</u> was written by our friend Jean. It is a collection of heartwarming short stories that take us on a journey from childhood to now. Through self-
